Eighth Grade Social Studies Information Sheet

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Description

The focus for social studies in 8th grade is the history of South Carolina and the role that the state and its people have played in the development of the United States as a nation. Students learn about the state's development during colonial times and the growth of the American ideal, which led to the break with England, South Carolina's role in the development of the new nation, and the Civil War. The study of the rebuilding of South Carolina after the Civil War and the continuing struggle for civil rights and justice waged by the people of South Carolina allows students to see the progress that the state has made and to appreciate the contributions that its people have made to the nation as a whole.

Requirements

Each unit of study will include daily lecture and discussion, various classroom activities, homework, quizzes and chapter tests. Students should have necessary supplies every day. Lectures will often be given in an outline-format, not unlike what they will see in high school and college classes. Students will be required to read regularly and be able to discuss in class readings that they've done at home. Webbased reading and discussion will also be increasingly used throughout the year.

Major Grades (400 points per quarter)

These include Tests, "SC Places" papers and major projects. Tests will be given periodically and will usually follow a format of Matching, Multiple Choice, Short Answer, and fill in the blank. Occasionally, there may be a short essay question.

Minor Grades (200 points per quarter)

These will include quizzes (20 points per quiz) and Classwork/Homework grades (10 points per assignment). Quizzes will generally be given weekly. Most quizzes will be based on the previous night's reading assignment. Students may take notes and home and have them out to use for quiz. Most Quizzes will be verbally administered and will be feature six questions with the chance to get 1 wrong and still get a 100. Homework will be given weekly and will be written on the upper right hand corner of my board. I will also explain homework verbally to the class. While my website is a good backup source, my classroom should be the first point of contact with any homework assignment. Late homework will be counted as a "0". OOPS passes can be used unless otherwise stated. (20% of total grade)

Projects/Papers:

Throughout the course of the year, you will be required to submit several papers and projects, which will be explained at the time of their assignment. All papers should be written using 12 point "Times New Roman" font and standard margins. Please turn them in promptly, as for each day late, one letter grade will be deducted from your score. Typlically projects will be worth a test grade.
